


TRANSCRIPT OF INTERVIEW BETWEEN AND AND ON 26.06.2008

What, what was it standing or No, no the horse was down and we'd tried to sit it up because I had actually said to well with it the longer it actually lies on its side the more problems there's going to be and with the breathing being like that, um, you know it is not natural for a horse. So I said let's try and get it into a sitting position. The horse couldn't hold itself Yeah In a sitting position. It was very, very uncoordinated, not able to co-ordinate at that time I said you know you really need to get the vet out here. Stre_said have got huge vet bills; there is no way I can get a yet out". I said, "Well put the horse down". Yeah "Well have got nothing to do it with". I said "This That is your other option. She says is a farming district, one of the neighbours is bound to have a rifle or something, if you can't do it get them to do it or get hold of it and I will do it for you".

Yeah.

Um and I sat with her for about three or four hours, there was no change in the horse.

Um and it was very very hot. There was no sort of shelter and at that time wasn't around but was coming back later on that evening so I actually left and the next day washed me to come up again and give them a bit of a hand and at this time the horse had been put in a sling.

To help it stand but it was still, the head had swollen quite considerably, the breathing was very, very laboured and the horse was obviously in a heck of a lot of stress. It wasn't drinking it wasn't eating.

Um and at that stage I repeated to them "Look hey you know, this, you have got two options, vet or put it down because this animal is suffering.
